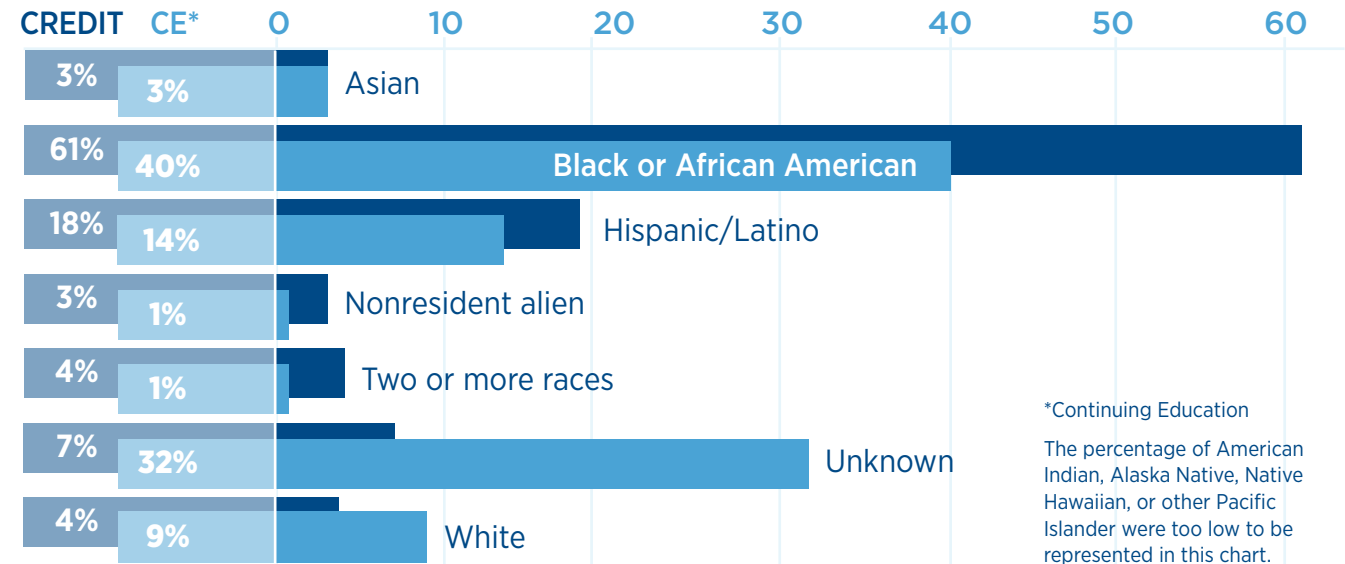

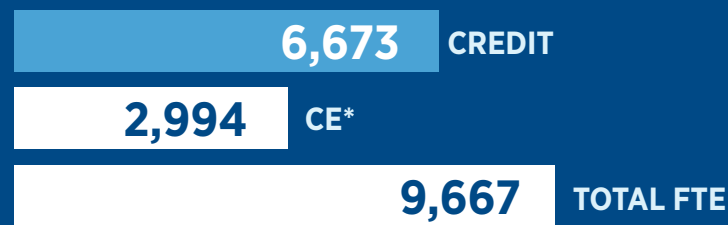

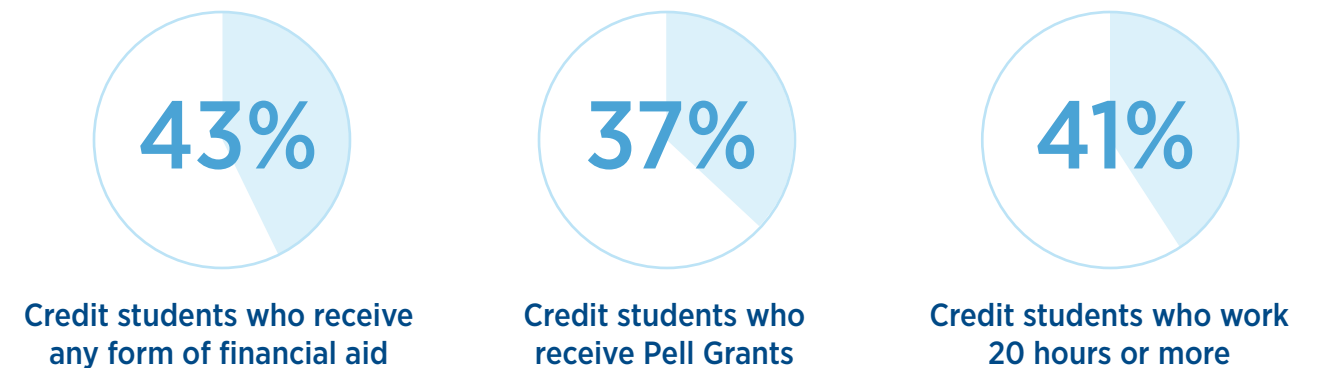

# Financial Aid and Scholarship Awards

More than 7,700 students received approximately \$33,000,000 in fiscal 2024 from grants, loans, student employment, and scholarships.

7,700 students received **\$33,000,000**

2,258 students were supported by scholarships from institutions, the PGCC Foundation, and outside sources.

The Prince George's County Promise Scholarship, a last-dollar scholarship, provided \$1.4 million to nearly 500 students. This scholarship covers tuition and fees remaining after other grants are considered.

The College acknowledges the impactful scholarship assistance from the PGCC Foundation of nearly \$940,000 to 695 students. This funding allowed students to start and continue matriculation during the 2023–2024 school year.

# Advocates for Access: Educational pathways to economic prosperity

Prince George's Community College (PGCC), in partnership with Community stakeholders and federal and state leaders, opens doors for all who wish to pursue higher education and greater economic achievement through public funding and advocacy for education access.

U.S. President Joe Biden and U.S. Department of Transportation Secretary Pete Buttigieg were among several government leaders to champion PGCC's efforts to reimagine workforce innovations and strategic partnerships.

In September 2023, U.S. President Joe Biden visited PGCC to deliver a speech about the American economy and strengthening the middle class. Biden also shared his wife's reflections about the importance of community colleges.

"She has an expression, 'Any country that out-educates us will out-compete us,'" Biden said. "The work you're doing here in preparing students to compete in the economy of the future is real. It matters."

In addition, U.S. Senator Benjamin L. Cardin, U.S. Senator Christopher Van Hollen, Jr., U.S. Congressman Steny Hoyer, and Governor Wes Moore also visited PGCC to bolster support for the College. Governor Moore announced that the State of Maryland will direct \$17 million to adult education, which includes funding for PGCC and 15 community colleges in the state.



U.S. Department of Transportation Secretary Pete Buttigieg awarded PGCC \$173,640 for the Commercial Motor Vehicle Operator Safety Training.

In October 2023, U.S. Department of Transportation Secretary Pete Buttigieg awarded PGCC \$173,640 for the Commercial Motor Vehicle Operator Safety Training (CMVOST) grant program. Since the grant's inception, 50 students received Commercial Driver's License training.

"We believe in community colleges. We believe in veterans, and we believe in the importance of trucking for the country, our economic security, and our future," Secretary Buttigieg said.

Omogoriola Olomo, 49, completed the CDL certification at PGCC in March 2024. He originally sought to enroll in the information technology program, but his passion for driving inspired a different career turn.

"I'm just the type of person that loves driving," Olomo said. "My hobby is driving. This life is about working to make money but also doing something that you love."

Olomo's son and daughter also attend PGCC. He has been a resident of Laurel, Maryland for ten years since emigrating from Nigeria.

Class A, CDL certified

Jonathan Lambert, 34, a U.S. Marines veteran injured during his service in Iraq, struggled for five years to find affordable training. He was ecstatic to receive a grant for his Class A Commercial Driver's License (CDL). "With the grant, it made things a lot more affordable," he said.

"When I found out, the first thing I did was I sat down with my kids and told them daddy's finally going to be driving trucks!"



He expressed deep gratitude to the government leaders who made it possible for him to receive a full grant to participate in the CDL program.

"I was lucky to be among those granted to be in the program free of charge," Olomo said. "I would like to say a very big thank you to the Governor and all the leaders who made the grant possible."

They are among approximately 500 American students at U.S. colleges and universities selected from over 5,000 applicants to study over a dozen languages overseas or virtually.



## WOW & DMSI

In fiscal year 2024, the Diverse Male Student Initiatives (DMSI) and Women of Wisdom programs experienced a **38 percent increase in student enrollment.**

Through collaborative efforts with the Predominately Black Institute Grant (PBI), both initiatives have enriched student experiences through mentorship, advising, and holistic support.

Initially, the PBI grant benefitted 315 students across the DMSI and WOW programs. However, in the subsequent year, this support expanded remarkably to encompass 749 Black/African American students. This enhanced outreach, alongside tailored services like tutoring, coaching, advising, and mentoring, has led to noticeable improvements in



student retention and completion rates. Notably, both programs have significantly contributed to increased graduation rates: Women of Wisdom (W.O.W.) with 179 graduates and the Diversity Male Student Initiative (DMSI) with 93.

A pivotal moment was the inaugural Elevation Summit, themed "Breaking Barriers and Empowering Change." This transformative event provided male students with workshops, keynote sessions, and panel discussions offering lifelong lessons. The workshops emphasized holistic student development, covering topics such as academic success, mental health and wellness, financial empowerment, and career readiness. The Summit will now become an annual

fixture, fostering partnerships and collaboration with campus and community stakeholders.

Following the success of last year's "Owl Rise" Summer Bridge Program, plans are underway for its return for a second year. This program, designed to facilitate the transition for students entering Prince George's Community College in the fall, equips them with the academic skills, support services, and social resources essential for success in a college environment. Efforts have expanded to include outreach to our extension centers, further enhancing its impact.

# First-rate Education: Preparing Maryland's future nurses



The Prince George's Community College (PGCC) Nursing Department rose to achieve nationally recognized high rankings after weathering several challenges in the aftermath of the COVID-19 pandemic. PGCC received a #1 ranking from The National Council of States Board of Nursing (NCSBN) NCLEX 23-24 report and touts a 100% National Council Licensure Examination (NCLEX) pass rate. It's a hard-won achievement after previous accreditation threats.

"My whole first year as the department chair was spent trying to work with the Maryland Board of Nursing to get us back on track and now we're back on track," Vivian Kuawogai, PGCC nursing department chair, said.

With support from federal and state grants, the department received a Congressionally Directed Spending Grant of \$971,000 through the Health Resources and Services Administration (HRSA) to fund equipment needed for the RN, PN, and CNA programs in the Center for Health Studies, the Laurel College Center, and University Town Center.

The Nursing Department was also awarded \$1,099,506 through the Nurse Support Program II (NSPII) with the Maryland Health Services Cost Review Center (HSCRC) and Maryland Higher Education Commission (MHEC). Through the MHEC grant, the Nursing Department has been able to invest over \$110k in faculty professional development.

In fiscal year 2024, the program honored 70 new graduates. Kuawogai credits the PGCC faculty, staff, administration, student support services, and the College foundation for their support.

"In order to have a successful program, you have to have the wraparound support from administration," Kuawogai said. "The College has been extremely supportive, and they have bent over backward to help us do what we need to do to educate our students."

Grant dollars from the Maryland Higher Education Commission's Nurse Support Program II and the Health Resources and Services Administration afforded the program the ability to hire new faculty with salary incentives and retention bonuses. In fall 2023, the program added an evening and weekend cohort. Nursing continuing education programs expanded to the Laurel campus and new equipment was purchased for the University Town Center campus.

"When you go to hospitals around the DMV, you will be amazed at how many nursing graduates from the PGCC program are staffing hospitals and doing advanced practice work," Kuawogai said.

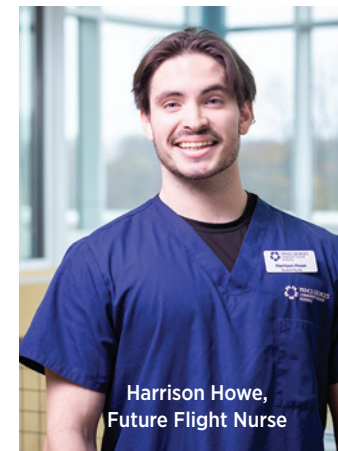
Solia Bikersteth, 32, is a Lanham, Maryland resident and works in the health care field as a Dialysis Technician. She chose to attend PGCC to receive her nursing education because of affordability and the success of her family and friends who have also attended the College for careers in the nursing field.

"The results show that the program works in terms of passing the NCLEX and ultimately, in a nursing program, that's what matters," Bickersteth said. "I'm not worried about whether or not I'll pass because clearly, the results show that the program works. It's reassuring to know that I chose a good program."

Bickersteth is preparing to become a nurse practitioner with a specialization in maternity and pediatrics. She plans to open a doula clinic that caters to Black and brown women in Prince George's County and Maryland.

Preparing to serve the needs of the community is a driving factor for many PGCC nursing students. Harrison Howe, 26, was born in Kansas City and raised primarily in D.C. He says beginning his career as an Emergency Department Patient Care Tech during the COVID-19 pandemic reinforced his desire to stick with the health care field. Howe followed in the footsteps of his mother who is also a nurse. He aspires to become a flight nurse who responds to remote emergency medical situations by airplane.

"It's a very cool career, Howe said. "I have a couple of the nurses that I've worked with previously that I really look up to who are currently flight nurses. It's a little bit more experienced and I think that it's something I would be quite good at."

As a student working part-time, Howe said he appreciates the flexibility and receptiveness of the professors at PGCC.

"The professors are very approachable," Howe said. "They care most about the fact you are grasping the learning materials. As long as you participate, it's

clear that you're trying, and that you are engaged in the learning process, they are willing to compromise and work with you."

The PGCC Nursing Department focuses on achievement by meeting students where they are and providing the necessary support for students to actualize their goals.

Prior to attending PGCC, Syite Paul, 34, spent years as a stay-at-home mom before deciding to enter the workforce as a health care professional.

"I wanted to be a nurse because I wanted to be a voice for my patients at the nursing home, and also, I have family members who battle cancer. I wanted to be a voice for my family."

Paul attended PGCC for her Certified Nursing Assistant and Licensed Practitioner Nurse certifications. She looks forward to working in a fast-paced environment as a trauma nurse.

"It's a great program," Paul said. "PGCC has the perfect set of teachers to help mold students into safety-conscious nursing professionals."

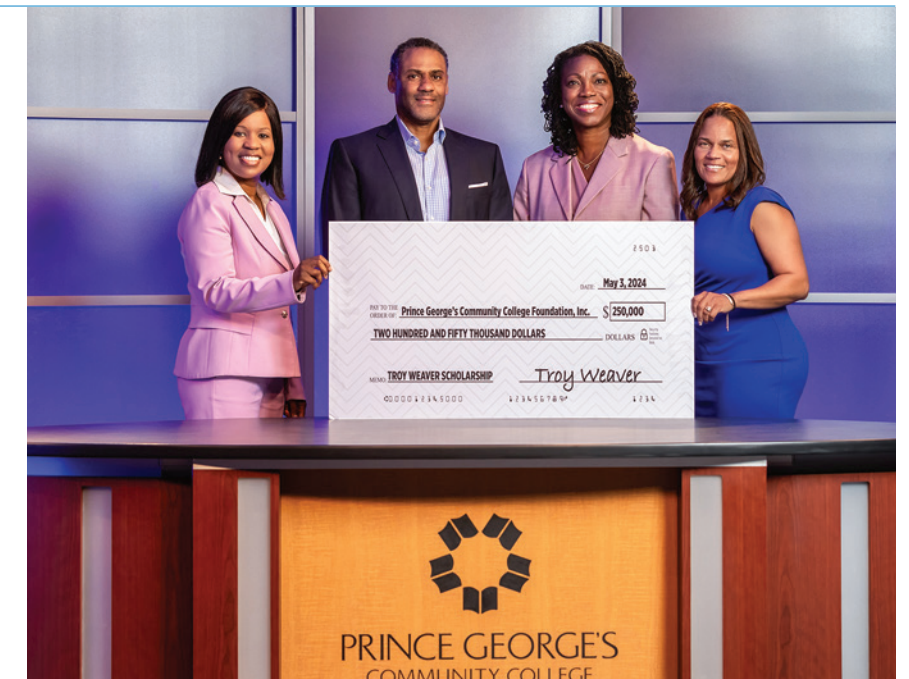

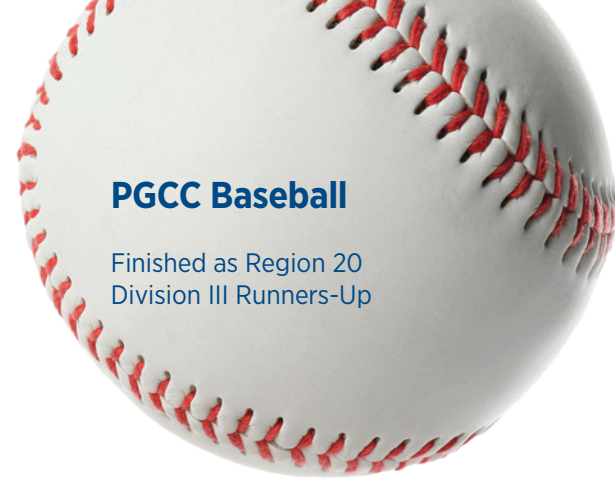

# A Look Ahead to 2050:

## The future of Prince George's Community College

Picture a college campus with lush green spaces, outdoor study areas, a prominent tower before a ceremonial quad, and a 6,000-seat arena. The future of Prince George's Community College (PGCC) goes beyond a typical community college to embody a premier educational environment that inspires change and empowers future leaders.

"Looking ahead, PGCC's 2050 vision, which includes the development of a three-campus model and the implementation of a new Facilities Master Plan, positions us to meet the evolving needs of Prince George's County and beyond," Dr. Falecia Williams, PGCC president, said.

Curating campus space that motivates students to achieve great things begins with thoughtful design.

"How you occupy space can set the tone for how you think about what's next," Don Pruett, director of Facilities Planning, Design, and Construction, said.

"We're trying to take you beyond what's next. We're going big!"

One of the main features of the new PGCC campus will be a "heart of campus" or centralized focal point near a ceremonial quad where families can take pictures, reflect, and eventually make space for the College to accommodate Commencement on campus as it was in previous years. Kent Hall will be removed to create the land space for this area.

In June 2025, the PGCC Largo campus will open Marlboro Hall which will house Humanities, English, Social Sciences, and Mathematics. The 215,000-square-foot building features a new gallery space along with ceramic sculpture, 3D modeling, drawing, and photographic art studios. It will also include a new College and professional testing center and offices for faculty and staff.

"Our unwavering commitment to workforce development is evident in the many success stories of students who have used their education to advance their careers and enrich their personal lives, both within and beyond the College doors," Dr. Williams said. "As we continue to grow and innovate, we remain focused on providing the resources and opportunities that will empower our students and drive the future of our region and beyond."

Prince George's Community College's three-campus model includes the Largo campus and full-service locations in northern and southern Prince George's County. The College is currently looking to acquire land in these areas.

The Largo campus, currently utilizing 105 of its 150 acres, will reimagine its parking with new garages, increasing capacity from 2,700 to 4,600 spaces. A new arena will host sports, concerts, and other events, creating an entertainment hub and revenue source. The new arena on PGCC's campus would be the first of its kind in the area.

"The development of new campuses and expanded resources for PGCC students will significantly enhance their overall college experience and generate a higher sense of belonging and individualized investment," Dr. Tyson J. Beale, vice president for Student Affairs at PGCC, said.

The 2050 vision for PGCC also includes a new recreational athletics and aquatics community center on the Largo campus and affordable dormitory-style housing for students with families.

More than creating a new campus aesthetic, PGCC leadership believes the new campus developments will improve campus culture.

"I can't wait to see our already vibrant community further engaged and optimizing new resources and learning tools," Dr. Beale said. "The growth of our institution will serve as a newfound beacon of opportunities for learners and the surrounding community. The buzz about new resources and expanded services will align with our strategic imperatives to expand access, diversity disciplinary offerings, and connect intently with workforce partners."



# Workforce Development:

## Vital support for regional economic growth

Workforce development at Prince George's Community College provides access to noncredit courses to strengthen job skills, career readiness, and personal enrichment. Certificates obtained through workforce development programs at PGCC prepare students to secure employment without associate or bachelor's degrees.

"Workforce development is crucial to regional economic growth because it provides the needed training for residents to enhance their employability skills to meet the high growth and in-demand careers across various industry sectors," John Deadwyler, program director for Workforce Development and Continuing Education Programs at PGCC, said.

The College offers a multitude of innovative workforce development programs, with over 500 online course options including Agriculture and Urban Farming, Computer Technology, Health Care, Education, Construction and Skilled Trades, English for Speakers of Other Languages (ESOL), Public Safety, Transportation, Distribution, and Logistics.

Infrastructure is one of the fastest-growing industries in the country and the Washington Metropolitan Region. The need for skilled workers to sustain and maintain infrastructure continues to evolve. PGCC's investment in these programs provides Prince George's County residents a pathway to careers in this sector, which is vital, particularly for members of historically disenfranchised communities.



TeamBuilders Academy (TBA), a 14-week construction, energy, and utilities training program, is one of the most prominent workforce development programs at PGCC. Washington Gas Company and Pepco partner with the College to provide TBA participants with internship experiences and job opportunities upon program completion. **The program boasts a 100 percent retention and completion rate, with a 73 percent job placement rate.**



**Phillip Barnum, 38,** completed TeamBuilders Academy in December 2023 and was hired as a maintenance technician with a large-scale property management company in the D.C. metropolitan area. Previously in 2013, he earned a GED at PGCC and began working up the career ranks in

retail. With a baby on the way, he wanted to try something different that yielded higher earning potential. This motivated him to train for a job working on heating, ventilation, and cooling (HVAC) systems.

"I've always enjoyed working with my hands and always enjoyed fixing things," Barnum said. "I come from a family of carpenters and a family of people working with their hands. I wanted to try to develop something that I already felt like I was good at."

Barnum had to work through feelings of fear and resentment to return to school because it wasn't always a source of positive memories for him.

"I've always been a pretty smart guy, but in school, I was a little bit bigger. Bullying was prevalent back then," Barnum said. "I had a lot of anxiety and still do in certain setting situations. The professors at PGCC did a terrific job of easing my fears and letting me know I can do this."

Barnum has newfound confidence in his career future after graduating from TBA.

"I am comfortable presenting my skills and certifications to market myself as a good candidate to stand out from other candidates during the interview process," Barnum said. "I did this not just to provide for myself and my family, but as something I can leave once my son gets of age. I want him to continue a legacy."



**Kevin Holland, 31,** a father of four from Fort Washington, Maryland, joined TBA following the advice of a friend who recommended the program. Previously, he ran his own business but

says that business slowed down and he needed a change. He shared that the TBA instructors made it a worthwhile learning experience.

"When I walked into a classroom, it was filled with positivity and that's what I was looking for, he said. "It's a positive program that I didn't mind spending my time to take a chance on learning."

Holland received four job offers even before the end of the TBA program. Upon graduation, he chose the most competitive offer with Washington Gas Company as a sales assistant. Today, he enjoys a fulfilling career outlook and a friendly work environment.

I was definitely overjoyed with the offer letter," Holland said. "I love my job and I don't mind being here for another 29 years. Everybody has a smile on their face and we have one common goal to get the job done as safely as possible and go home to our families."

After completing the TBA program and being employed for more than a year, Holland feels settled and notes how he carries a more disciplined mindset.

"I feel like I have to carry myself differently now that I have completed the program to show who I have become because I'm not the same person," Holland said. "I have to carry forth the positivity."
